Message From Pastor Michael Kea

I just wanted to take a moment today to share something that's been stirring in my heart, something vital for our growth as individuals and as a community of faith. We often talk about the good things God has done, and that's right—we should celebrate His faithfulness! But today, I want us to lean into a truth that can sometimes feel challenging: **the essential need for flexibility.**

We all know people who get stuck in the comfortable "way things have always been." They love tradition, and there's beauty in that, but when we resist the change God is initiating, we risk stagnation. The danger of resisting change isn't just that we miss out on a good idea; the danger is that we miss out on a **blessing**. When we stubbornly hold onto the past, we build a wall against the future God is creating for us.

Think about the world outside our windows. We live in a place of gorgeous, distinct **seasons**. What would happen if a mighty oak tree decided it liked its green summer leaves so much that it refused to shed them in the fall? It would be unprepared for the winter snow, and the weight of that refusal would break its branches.

The tree understands a profound lesson: **To survive and thrive, you must remain flexible.** You must cooperate with the changing of the seasons. If we want to stay healthy and fruitful in our faith and our church, we must be like that tree, ready to shed what was, and to be led by the Spirit when the Lord signals a new season.

God's work is dynamic; it is constantly moving forward. And He is always calling us to meet Him in the **new thing** He is doing. That's why the Scripture challenges us:

"Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." (Isaiah 43:19)

Do you not perceive it? That question cuts right to the heart of the matter. God is doing something new *right now*, but if our eyes are fixated only on the familiar, we won't even see the fresh stream of water He's providing in our desert.

Let's commit to being a church family that faces new challenges—new outreach methods, new community needs, new ways of serving—not with dread or resistance, but with **excited**

flexibility. Let's trust that the Hand guiding our ship knows the waters, even if they look different than they did last year.
I'm praying for us all to have hearts that are open, humble, and ready to say, "Yes, Lord!

Show me the new thing, and I will be flexible enough to follow."
